"Who Will Be Accountable? Human Rights and the Post-2015 Development Agenda"



The process of reviewing and replacing the Millennium Development Goals in 2015 provides an unmissable opportunity to address the accountability gaps in the MDGs and to ensure that the new framework of development commitments does not result in a set of unfulfilled promises. People "demand a framework that holds governments and others to account for the implementation of their commitments in the post-2015 agenda" and "present human rights as a non-negotiable element to deliver this accountability."
